### CONFERENCE SESSION DETAIL/COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

### SATURDAY MARCH 12, 2022 8a-6p

• SESSION 1 Opening Keynote: 8a-840a Surviving Cardiac Arrest (Nevers) - This presentation will share a detailed story of a survivor of cardiac arrest. Scott Nevers is a Mainer who as a young man suffered sudden cardiac arrest, with no warning, no risk factors, during a sports event. His captivating story will illustrate just how important what we do in EMS is, and how one survivor's story can make a difference. Since his survival, Scott has dedicated his life to promoting CPR and AED placement and training. Because if one life is saved, it makes all the difference in the world!



### SESSION 2: 845a-945a Suspended Animation: Surviving Hypothermic Cardiac

**Arrest** (Jaeger) - This presentation will share vivid, well documented stories of incredible survival from hypothermic cardiac arrest. Recent events demonstrate the importance of this topic even in southern parts of the country where life threatening hypothermia was thought to be a rare event. The case reports we'll explore involve cardiac arrest events spanning six hours or more, with good neurological outcomes. We'll examine the pathophysiology of hypothermia, key determinants of survival following hypothermic cardiac arrest, and the trauma system infrastructure (including ECMO) necessary to support successful outcomes.

- SESSION 3: 10a-11a **Tranexamic Acid: Battlefield to the Street** (Myers) Tranexamic acid (TXA) is used worldwide in the treatment of hemorrhagic shock. While it has been used for a long time in other settings, its use in trauma became more wide-spread in the austere battlefield environment. Recently, TXA has transitioned into civilian trauma care with many EMS systems adopting TXA for use in out of hospital trauma care. In this interactive session, we will discuss the physiology of and the role TXA plays in treating hemorrhagic shock.
- SESSION 4: 1115a-1215p The Real Volunteer Crisis (Ogilvie) Everyone talks about the lack of volunteers in both EMS and the fire service. Everyone talks
  about the changing economy and world we live in as a hurdle for volunteer recruitment and
  retention. Yet, most volunteer organizations continue to recruit and retain volunteers without
  regard to these changes. If we're going to fix the volunteer crisis, we must start with fixing
  volunteer organizations and their culture!

- SESSION 5: 115p-215p 60 Things in 60 Minutes (Limmer) Developed as a sequel to Dan's popular 75 Things in 75 Minutes, this presentation moves along
  at a rapid pace, provides a variety of insights throughout the EMS scope, and fits Dan's limited
  attention span. With concepts from safety to assessment to diagnosis to operations, you will
  learn—Learn 60 things in 60 minutes!
- SESSION 6: 230p-330p Heart Disease and Gender, Is There a Gender Bias? (Werfel) We all know that women are different than men. But when women suffer heart attacks are the symptoms different? Are demographics like mortality and morbidity the same? Do women get adequate treatment? Join EMS instructor and author Paul Werfel for an in depth look at the gender gap in heart disease and its treatment.
- SESSION 7: 345p-445p Blocked and Unfriended, By My Own Heart: Understanding Heart Blocks in the Young (Putnam) - Heart block is a rare condition normally affecting older patients. If you saw it in younger patients, would signs and symptoms make you suspicious enough to do a 12 lead EKG? Some are relatively benign but many can carry serious complications or be deadly. We'll review heart blocks, discuss causes from conduction abnormalities to diseases like Lyme and explore permanent treatments we may encounter. Come with us on this journey (one which your instructor has personal experience with!) with case studies and learn how to make a positive impact.
- SESSION 8: 5p-6p Syncope, A Wolf in Sheep's Clothing (Politis) Syncope or fainting is perhaps one of the most under assessed and minimized complaints that many EMS providers see. In fact, syncope is a potentially lethal chief complaint and needs to be worked up with the same sense or urgency as chest pain, breathing difficulty and other serious complaints. In this case study based presentation The major causes of syncope will be discussed along with assessment and treatment of the various causes.

### Dr Jeff Myers, DO, EdM, EMT-P, FAEMS

Dr. Myers helps EMS providers up their game and become better clinicians through education and mentoring. He has also served as the Chief of his community volunteer fire department. Frequently featured on videos and radio programs, Professor Werfel is a member of the editorial board for EMS World Magazine and for many years held the same position with JEMS magazine, authoring the "Ask the Educator" column on the JEMS web site as well as primary author for the "Case of the Month" column In JEMS magazine for seven years. 


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
